
Dear Mr. Greeson:

I am pleased to advise that the City Commission of the City of Fernandina Beach has accepted the proposal of the County for fire protection on the island outside the City limits for the sum of \$250,000.00 as per your letter dated July 1, 1982. We understand this is for the cost of operating Station No. 3 including normal commodities necessary thereto. We do not understand this to include any large capital expenditure that might be necessary during the three year period. The City understands that any expenditure of this nature would have to be approved by the County and City Commissions before being made if both are to participate in the cost thereof.

We are pleased that the two governments have been able to come to this agreement and assure you that we are going to do everything in our power to see that the area is well served with the type of service that both the City and County Commissions can look to with pride.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT entered into this _____ day of _____, 1982, by and between the BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF NASSAU COUNTY, FLORIDA, whose address is Post Office Box 1010, Fernandina Beach, Florida, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY" and the CITY COMMISSION of the CITY OF FERNANDINA BEACH, FLORIDA, whose address is Post Office Box 668, Fernandina Beach, Florida, hereinafter referred to as "CITY", for and in consideration of the monies to be paid by COUNTY to CITY and the services rendered to CITY AND COUNTY, beginning October 1, 1982, as hereinafter expressed, agree as follows:

1.) COUNTY agrees to pay CITY \$250,000.00 per year for fire service as hereinafter defined for a period of three (3) years within the unincorporated area of Amelia Island, Florida and rescue service in all areas of Amelia Island and Nassau County east of I-95. Payment shall be made on a quarterly basis beginning with the end of the first quarter of fiscal year 1982-83. Beginning with the second year of this contract, in addition to the \$250,000.00 stated above, there shall be an increased payment based on the percentage of increase of the Commodity Price Index as reported by the United States Department of Labor over the preceding year.

2.) Fire service is defined as fire control, suppression, inspection and all other duties normally associated with fire service. Fire service includes, but is not limited to, the manning of the fire station at A-1-A and Lewis Street on Amelia Island, known as Station No. 3, on a twenty-four (24) hour a day basis.

3.) a.) Rescue service shall include the manning of rescue station at Fire Station No. 1 at 204 Ash Street, within the City limits of the City of Fernandina Beach, Florida, at Station No. 3, at A-1-A and Lewis Street on Amelia Island, and shall meet all federal and state requirements with a minimum level of basic

life support certification and one (1) unit shall be certified as an advanced life support unit. Advance life support assistance shall be provided to all areas East of I-95 within Nassau County. Rescue service includes, but is not limited to, enough personnel and management to staff rescue vehicles on a twenty-four (24) hour, seven (7) day week basis for three (3) years.

b.) This agreement shall be renegotiated in the event of an increase by state or federal law in the number of personnel required to man rescue vehicles.

c.) COUNTY shall supply one A.L.S. and one B.L.S. rescue vehicle complete, including all accessories, and radio communication equipment coordinated with the radio communication system of the Nassau County Sheriff's Office.

d.) CITY shall provide rescue service for emergency call only, and not for transfers, funerals, etc.

e.) The decision of where to take patients on rescue calls shall be made by officials of the CITY at the scene, with the patient's life being of first concern.

f.) The operation of fire and rescue service be the sole responsibility of CITY and within full control of CITY and its authorized representatives. CITY agrees to give due consideration to suggestions or recommendations made by the BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF NASSAU COUNTY, FLORIDA.

4. CITY will maintain and repair all fire stations but shall not be responsible for unusual, abnormal or structural repairs necessitated by acts of God, fire or other calamity.

5.) CITY will pay for all telephone communication expense and equipment required for the fire stations and for the rescue vehicles, except as noted in Paragraph 7 below. ~~COUNTY will furnish the fuel and lubricants for fire and rescue equipment owned or leased by COUNTY and located at Station No. 3.~~

6.) COUNTY agrees to place one A.L.S. rescue unit at Station No. 1 and one B.L.S. rescue unit at Station Number 3. The CITY agrees to provide certified personnel for a B.L.S. unit at Station No. 3. The COUNTY will keep a B.L.S. unit at the

Yulee Station and continue the basic life support rescue service at the said Yulee station.

7.) COUNTY will furnish all medical supplies to be used in rescue vehicles. COUNTY will furnish rescue maintenance expenses in excess of \$25.00 per item for rescue service. CITY will pay the first \$25.00 per item of such expense.

8.) COUNTY acknowledges and agrees that to perform this agreement, CITY shall employ not less than nine (9) employees to man Station No. 3 and that upon the expiration of this agreement on September 30, 1985 provided this agreement is not renewed, COUNTY where permitted by the County's affirmative action and personnel policies shall continue the employ of such employees unless one or more of the positions held by such employees is deleted, by COUNTY. Provided, further however, that COUNTY shall retain the right at any time after September 30, 1985, to discharge any of such employees for cause, in accordance with COUNTY'S personnel policies and procedures then in existence.

9.) CITY will permit COUNTY to utilize the fire station for voting precincts.

10.) CITY will provide all insurance coverage for the staff and all buildings and equipment titled in its name. COUNTY will provide all insurance on vehicles and buildings titled or leased in its name and shall provide medical malpractice insurance on medical personnel serving in a rescue capacity.

11.) This agreement shall terminate on September 30, 1985, at 11:59 o'clock p.m.

THIS AGREEMENT is not assignable and is the complete understanding of the parties and may be amended, however, in writing and executed with the same formalities.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 1982, by and between NASSAU COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Florida, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY"; and _____, hereinafter referred to as "FIRE DEPARTMENT".

WITNESSETH: That in consideration of the sum of TEN AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$10.00), and other good and valuable considerations, as hereinafter enumerated, the parties hereto do hereby agree as follows:

1. The COUNTY hereby agrees to provide the FIRE DEPARTMENT with certain fire equipment when available.

2. That it shall be the responsibility of the FIRE DEPARTMENT to provide fire protection service in Fire District Number _____ of Nassau County, Florida.

3. That this Agreement shall incorporate the following provisions:

1.) The fire protection service shall be provided on a twenty-four (24) hour basis.

2.) That the COUNTY shall also maintain adequate personal liability insurance on all duly trained volunteers.

3.) The FIRE DEPARTMENT shall pay all regular maintenance costs, including gas, oil, and other fluids necessary to maintain fire protection equipment.

4.) The COUNTY shall appropriate to the FIRE DEPARTMENT the sum of \$_____. The COUNTY shall require an audit for all funds paid to FIRE DEPARTMENT and said FIRE DEPARTMENT shall keep proper accounting records to be approved by COUNTY or its agents. An acceptable accounting of previous year

funds must be presented to COUNTY before current year appropriations will be disbursed by COUNTY.

5.) The fire protection equipment shall be based at the Fire Department Station with normal care and protection provided by the FIRE DEPARTMENT.

6.) The fire protection equipment shall be on call twenty-four (24) hours a day and seven (7) days a week.

7.) The FIRE DEPARTMENT shall keep a record (log) of each call. All records are to be open for inspection by the COUNTY at all times and subject to audit by the COUNTY or its agents.

8.) City or association operated fire protection equipment in the COUNTY will provide backup service for other departments as deemed necessary, whether in unincorporated or incorporated areas.

9.) The FIRE DEPARTMENT shall use the State of Florida, Standard Fire Reporting Form in reporting each call.

10.) Any change or addition to this Agreement will be decided by consultation between the COUNTY COMMISSION and the , as it pertains to budgetary or other matters.

This contract shall be in full force and effect for a period of October 1, 1982 to September 30, 1983, however, it may be terminated by either party within THIRTY (30) days after notice having been given by registered mail, one party to the other. Any cancellation by either party shall require a prorata refund of all funds to the COUNTY of those appropriated. Said refund shall be based on the amount of time that has elapsed in any particular fiscal year.
