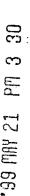

All of this equipment and software will be purchased out of the current Emergency Management Preparedness Grant (EMPA) and the Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS) Grant funds. This will not incur any debt to the General Fund for this fiscal year.

This software and hardware will be required to be purchased from the E911 special account. There is currently not enough reserve in this account to cover all of this equipment, so a budget amendment would be required. Required dollar amounts for transfer are listed together at the end in the recommendations.

External Support

An RFP has been developed to accept proposals for a consultant to initialize the mapping concept in the county. Current contractors charge approximately \$400-500 per day for this type of service. We would need 30 days coverage over the nine (9) month period. Estimated cost (using maximum rate) for a consultant would be: COST: \$15,000.00

This cost is a General Revenue account requirement. As stated earlier, this cost will be summarized in the recommendations.

Community Alerting System

As listed in the 5 Year Strategic Plan, Goal 2, Task 2.1.1, identify the most coast efficient method of community alerting and implement. A rough RFP is being prepared to request final costs. Preliminary costs shoe figures of, not to exceed, \$36,000.00 for a county of 60,000-75,000 people. Cost not to exceed:

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. Immediately authorize the posting of the two positions in E911 addressing (Coordinator & Data Entry) and align the Over-Sight, Technical Support and Account Signing Authority for the entire E911 addressing program to OEM for at least the next year or until the new EOC is built. These people would rotate with the East Mapping Team as the third team person when not inputting data into the mapping system in house or assigning new addresses for permitting.
- 2. The team leader position on the East Team should be a new salaried position. Authorize the new position as an Emergency Management Planner. This position would be responsible for the East Team Vector Mapping and Critical Facilities mapping in relationship to the 911 CAD mapping effort. Salary (25K) and benefits would total \$32,000.00 a year. Current fiscal year cost \$16,000.00. This would be a permanent staff member in the future budgeting, therefore it requires a Budget Amendment.
- 3. Contract on a 1099 basis (flat fee concept) for a \$400.00 per week assistant that is used for the "Life-Cycle" of the mapping program (about 9 months = \$11,000.00)
- 4. Purchase the required mapping equipment and software to support mapping in Emergency Management and E911 Addressing, using the Emergency Management and Emergency Management Preparedness Grant accounts and the E911 Special Revenue Account.
- 5. Use Art Nichols and the two assigned personnel from Road and Bridge, who are currently hand mapping the western roads of the county, to establish the West Mapping Team. They would answer to the Emergency Management Director for Mapping duties only.
- 6. After the proper RFP/RFQ is submitted and accepted, purchase the Community Alerting System from 1 Cent Sales Tax funds.
- 7. Complete an Inter-Local Agreement with the Sheriff to oversee the 911 communications and dispatch system, including an SOP between users
- 8. Review the equipment requirements with Bell South to go forward with the Enhanced Stage of the 911 communications link equipment. Ensure complete compatibility with the Mapping MSAG.

could be accomplished in the Clerk's office or the County Coordinator's office, \$.30 per mile, and a vehicle provided by the County within Nassau County, and long distance telephone calls can be made in a County office.

Upon the recommendation of the County Attorney, it was moved by Commissioner Marshall, seconded by Commissioner Howard, and unanimously carried to move up a day the trip to Tallahassee for Legislative Day and to schedule appointments with Senator Mitchell and Representative Crady on March 23, 1999 and to approve travel for Commissioner Marshall and Mr. Gossett and anyone who would like to go to attend the Transportation Disadvantaged Day Conference in Tallahassee on March 5, 1999.

Upon the request and recommendation of the County Attorney, it was moved by Commissioner Howard, seconded by Commissioner Vanzant, and unanimously carried to schedule a Public Hearing at 7:00 P.M. on March 15, 1999 for the consideration of the contemplated issuance and sale by Nassau County of not to exceed \$23.3 million pollution control private activity revenue bonds, Series 1999 (Rayonier, Inc. project).

Attorney Mullin referred to a report from the committee addressing the 911 addressing and mapping and listing certain equipment in the amount of \$340,000 that

the Nassau County Sheriff needs for Y2K. He stated that the County Commission would not be involved in the acquisition of the equipment. The Sheriff would need a net of \$240,000 since he has \$100,000 in confiscated drug money that could be used for the down payment. The Sheriff would finance the balance himself. Attorney Mullin stated the Board would need to approve a covenant to budget and appropriate for funds as are necessary for this equipment, and if there are confiscated drug funds available, that might not be necessary. Any funds appropriated could be reimbursed from confiscated drug funds. Mr. Oxley explained that when the Sheriff leases this equipment, the first year would be paid from confiscated drug funds, and he would have four years of payments for which the Board would need to covenant to budget and appropriate necessary funds that are not available through confiscated drug It was moved by Commissioner Marshall, seconded by Commissioner Vanzant, and unanimously carried to covenant to budget and appropriate necessary funds in the amount of \$240,000 to cover for four years the lease payment for equipment required by the Sheriff's Department for Y2K compliance.

Attorney Mullin stated that the final judgment on the ADA lawsuit, No. 95-022-CA, was issued on January 27, 1999,
